Ohio's legal aid organizations provide essential legal services to help Ohioans resolve their legal issues so they can live safer, healthier, and more financially stable lives. Robust funding for the Legal Services Corporation (LSC) is critical to ensuring that Ohio's legal aids are able to help low-income Ohioans resolve civil legal challenges.

THE PROBLEM



Millions of low-income Americans do not have access to justice in civil court cases affecting their housing, their finances, and their families because they cannot afford legal representation.

Providing robust, federal financial support for Ohio's legal aids ensures that attorneys are available to help your constituents stabilize their housing, seal past criminal records to get better jobs, and protect themselves from domestic violence.

Helping a Veteran Escape Her Abusive Husband

Adalyn Gray,* a proud veteran and mother of two small children, was physically abused by her husband. Scared and worried about her and her children's safety, Ms. Gray left their marital home and reached out to legal aid for help.

Legal aid helped Ms. Gray obtain a Civil Protection Order (CPO) to ensure that her husband couldn't reach her or her children. In addition, legal aid ensured that Ms. Gray was awarded custody of her children. Thanks to legal aid, Ms. Gray can move forward with her life and raise her children in a safe environment free of violence.
